What is PrEP? Is it new?

Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) is a drug taken by HIVnegative people before and after sex that prevents HIV transmission.

PrEP is not new. The concept of PrEP has been present since the 1980s and has been made freely available on the National Health Service (NHS) since April 2020.

When should I talk about PrEP?

You should discuss PrEP when you provide health interventions with anyone who may be at risk of acquiring HIV. Some groups have a higher risk, such as gay, bisexual, men who have sex with men (GBMSM), sex workers, intravenous drug users and Black African communities.

Who should take it?

You may see patients who would benefit from PrEP during routine health care, vaccination or contraceptive clinics. Uptake of PrEP is not equal, with not all communities equally benefiting. This includes women, heterosexual men and people in Black African communities. PrEP can be used by people of all genders and sexualities.

If somebody is on PrEP, does this mean they have HIV?

No. PrEP is for people **without** HIV who may be exposed to HIV through sex or injection drug use.



However, please don't make assumptions about the lifestyles of those using PrEP. Some people use PrEP because they have partners who are living with HIV, some may use PrEP because they are choosing to have sex without condoms, or they are concerned their partner is having unsafe sex elsewhere.



PrEP may also be an option to help protect pregnant people and their babies from getting HIV while trying to get pregnant, during pregnancy, or while breastfeeding.

What's the difference between PrEP & PEP for HIV prevention?

PrEP stands for pre-exposure prophylaxis and is taken before being exposed to HIV. PrEP is used in a planned way on an ongoing basis.

PEP stands for post-exposure prophylaxis and is taken after a single event after exposure to HIV. PEP is used in emergency situations.

What is U=U?



Undetectable = Untransmittable

This relates to the fact that people living with HIV who are on treatment, and have a fully supressed viral load, have a zero risk of transmitting the HIV virus to their sexual partners.

An individual living with HIV is defined as achieving U=U when they have been on treatment for 6 months and have achieved an undetectable viral load.

We can't offer PrEP, so why discuss it?

Encouraging PrEP use supports the commitment to end HIV transmissions.

However, we know that young people, those from ethnic minority

communities, heterosexual men and women, trans and non-binary people and people who inject drugs often have lower knowledge of, access to, and uptake of PrEP.


Using the information above may help you identify somebody who is at risk of acquiring HIV, but hasn't considered using PrEP, either because they don't know about it, or thought it wasn't for them.



What else can you do as a healthcare professional?

You can empower individuals to make informed decisions about their sexual health and maintaining their overall wellbeing, including PrEP.

Remind those you identify that PrEP is one method of supporting HIV prevention.





Regular Testing - It is recommended that everyone who is sexually active gets tested for HIV and other STIs at least once a year, and always after unprotected sex with a new partner.

How can people get PrEP?

PrEP is available from sexual health clinics, free of charge. Patients attending a sexual health clinic will be seen by a specialist clinician, who will undertake a HIV test, to ensure the patient is HIV negative. There will also be tests for STIs, Hepatitis B and C, and kidney function.


